*Academic Facts

1. 120 credits are required for a degree.
2. Additional credits to fulfill university graduation requirement of at least 120 credits. May be taken in open electives to pursue additional majors and minors.
3. Transfer students must complete a minimum of 60 credits at Marywood University, divided between the major and the liberal arts.
4. Advanced courses in the major are taken at Marywood University. Courses to complete the liberal arts requirements may be taken at other universities and transferred at the grade level of C or above.
5. The student must maintain a GPA of 2.33 in the major and 2.00 overall to graduate as well as to be retained in the program. Students planning on attending law school or graduate school should strive to achieve a GPA of 3.00 or above.
6. Academically eligible students may be invited to memberships in Phi Alpha Theta, the International History Honor Fraternity and/or Pi Gamma Mu, the International Social Science Honor Fraternity through resident chapters.
7. The History Society, Sigma Pi Mu, is open to all students at Marywood.
